

Famous for what was then a unique attitude â " a willingness tolearn from and use the knowledge and skills of aboriginal peoples â " Rae becamethe first European to survive an Arctic winter while living solely off the land. One of dozens of explorers and naval men commissioned by the BritishAdmiralty to find out what became of Sir John Franklin and his two ships, Raereturned from the Arctic to report that the most glorious expedition everlaunched had ended with no survivors â " and worse, that it had degenerated intocannibalism. Unwilling to accept that verdict, Victorian England not onlyostracized Rae, but ignored his achievements, and credited Franklin with thediscovery of the Passage. Fatal Passage is Ken McGooganâ ™s brilliant vindication of John Raeâ ™slife and rightful place in history, a book for armchair adventurers, Arcticenthusiasts, lovers of Canadian history, and all those who revel in a story of physical courage andmoral integrity.
